The United States Army won the war in Europe because scores of African American troops hauled thousands of pounds of equipment to the troops in the field. They were called the Red Ball Express, and almost 75% of those that transported the beans and bullets to the troops were black soldiers. I thought it would be fitting as we wind down Black History Month to give a shout out to these unsung American heroes who provided the infrastructure for victory.

"Infrastructure Needs," is what I am entitling this edition of The Stewardship Coach. In this post, I want to lay out what I feel is one of the biggest challenges facing the Church today, infrastructure.

In our army, the Lord's Army, it is those that are on the front lines that garner the most attention. Those that are upfront on the platform during worship services are typically the ones that get the most attention, accolades, and even credit for the growth of a church. Yet, without all the volunteers in the background, nothing will be accomplished on the platform. They provide the support you need to do the ministry you are called to accomplish. They are your human infrastructure. Without them, you are in trouble.

What if your volunteers arrived one Sunday morning to serve in your children's area, and there was no heat? What if there was no electricity, running water or even supplies to teach with? What if their rooms were old, shabby or too small and ill-equipped to do the work of ministry they have volunteered to do? What if you did not have enough money to keep the lights on, pay the bills or pay your staff? All of these scenarios are infrastructural issues. You face all of them every week.

You ignore your infrastructure to your peril! Destroy your enemy's infrastructure and you have destroyed their capacity to wage war. Just ask Napoleon how important infrastructure is. Or, ask the Confederates how much Sherman's March to the Sea hampered their ability to wage war. America, during the first Gulf War, bombed Iraq for days before the ground attack. The first days focused upon the Iraqi's infrastructure. Smart military planners know that if you destroy your enemy's ability to supply their troops, you limit their ability to wage war.

The old adage is true; armies fight on beans and bullets. 80% of the jobs in the military are non-combat related. The Red Ball Express ferried countless supplies to the front lines in Europe during World War II. Without those supplies, our troops would never have been successful. The supply sergeant and his troops had as much to do with winning the war as the guys in the trenches.

"If the foundations are destroyed"...Psalms 11:3 The 20<sup>th</sup> century foundations the Church rests upon are eroding and will not support the 21<sup>st</sup> century Church for much longer. The 21<sup>st</sup> century church has an already

challenging future. The increased secularization of society will increase our challenge. We are in the midst of incredible and fast pace changes. "If the foundations are destroyed, what can the righteous do?"

I am an infrastructure guy. Most in your church never know I exist. I am called by God and equipped by the Holy Spirit to address two key challenges to our foundation, declining generosity and deteriorating facilities. These two infrastructural issues are intricately linked together.

My focus is upon securing your foundation in two ways. First, we need to work to maximize the current giving capacity we have, while at the same time focus on bringing up the next generation of givers. Remember that the Blackbaud Institute stated two years ago that we had a five-year window left at the current rate of giving from Baby Boomers, America's largest donor group by dollars given.

Secondly, for many churches, their 1960 era structures are tired, worn out and way past time for renovation. The longer you kick the can down the road on these issues the harder it will be for you to dig out of the hole you are creating. In my experience, the hardest dollar to raise today is dollars for renovation. Your members walk right by that threadbare carpet the same way you ignore the holes in that favorite sweater. Thousands of churches have put off much needed renovation and this will compound the difficulty of keeping them financially secure for the future. What needs to be done? A lot! Our long-term neglect of infrastructural issues has exacerbated our problems. As I have been saying, we did not get into this problem overnight and we will not get out of the problem with quick, easy fixes. If you don't address this now it will be increasingly difficult to solve the infrastructural challenges facing you.

You need two things to address your infrastructure challenges. You need a plan of action and you need someone who owns that plan and holds everyone accountable to follow through on the plan. I can help deliver this for you!

Let me end with one of my famous Brooks mantras,

The church that survives in the future is the church that plans TODAY for tomorrow!
